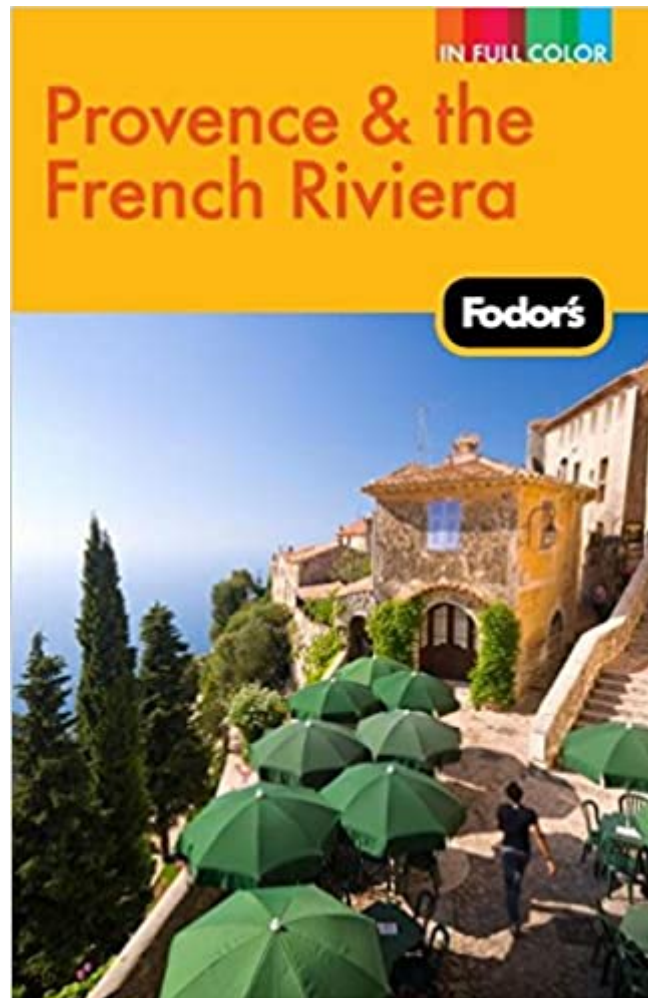

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I have found all of the Fodor’s guides very helpful and greatly add to my enjoyment of my trips. The

maps and descriptive material are excellent. My one criticism is that the detailed maps do not tie in together very well. There ought to be some additional maps showing the areas between the ones portrayed in the detailed maps of the main tourist areas so that one can more easily understand what is between the main tourist attractions. More specifically, I would suggest dividing the region covered into about four sub regions and providing good maps of each. Nevertheless, the guide, as written, is a very good value.

The detail in the guide is very useful. The organization is such that I had difficulty finding the sections I wanted to view. Part of this is due to the limitations of the Kindle itself. The Kindle version does not have pictures which most guides do have and which would assist greatly in assessing whether or not to visit the sites.

This was ok. If you are really into this area of France, and have a car, it will be helpful. If you're just there for a few days or just to find lavender, it's not worth the investment.

Fodor;s Provence took a large area of France and broke it down into the smaller towns and all the great sights to see in each area. I found this very helpful and easy to understand. It also made it very easy to plan where to stay and how much time to spend in each area.

Good summary of the area. It could use more maps but overall it is enjoyable and fast. It's seems to concentrate on higher-end places to eat and stay and this is an expensive area, but now that I'm here, there are a lot of more reasonably-priced options.

Haven't been to Provence yet, but gathering info on it using this guide and Rick Steve's guide is preparing us seemingly well for our trip. Narrowing down must-do sites is easier knowing what is recommended by both.

I didn't really find this useful for the Cote d'Azur, which is what I needed it for.
