


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Silence Fallen (A Mercy Thompson Novel)





Synopsis

First, my only real criticism (and this is for the book specifically as well as the series generally): the book basically opens with Mercy getting kidnapped. Again. There are really only so many times a

woman should be kidnapped in her life. (I read a book once where the MC was kidnapped at least four times in one book. That's bordering on ridiculous.) Mercy has spent a lot of time in this series getting kidnapped and assaulted. The saving grace is that she does get to spend some time rescuing her wolves from kidnapping as well. Sidebar: I would love to read a PNR or urban fantasy series where the main female character is never once kidnapped or sexually assaulted. (I'm totes okay with physical assault, because violence is part of the genre...sexual violence doesn't need to be.) ANYWAY - the best part of this book? Mercy is a self-rescuing kidnap victim. (The other best part? Bran. I love me some Bran. He is terrifying and awesome, which is exactly as he should be.)Oh wait! There's a third best part! Larry![Elizaveta:] "The blue room should be adequate for the goblin king."We don't call ourselves that," said Larry dryly. "That was just that one movie. I mean, 'Larry the Goblin King' just doesn't have the right ring to it."Ooooh - and Stefan and Marsilia! I do enjoy the vampires (Wulf gives me the wig, though.)One of the interesting parts of this book was that the chapters were split up between Adam and Mercy chapters, and that made the timeline...a bit wibbly-wobbly (Ms. Briggs is a Whovian; there's a Matt Smith in the book who is definitely not the Doctor). I enjoyed it immensely and thought Ms. Briggs did an exceptional job with that. It was also fun that most of the action took place in Europe - particularly Prague. The Verdictlt's hard to keep a series and characters interesting and fresh, and Patricia Briggs has managed to continue to do so. This was more than worth the time and money spent for the latest in the series and I'm definitely looking forward to Mercy's next adventure.

This is my favorite Mercy Thompson book yet. I loved the back and forth point of view between Mercy and Adam. It reminded me of a Kate Daniels book, but not in a rip off kind of way, but as a inspiration. It was cool to have everyone travel outside of Washington even if not by choice. Also Matt Smith kept bothering me. I kept thinking boy this submissive is pushy and has a lot to say, I loved the twist. What I loved most about this book was Mercy learning more about her abilities, and the love and respect she has from her father's. The exploration into Mercy's power over the dead was cool, and something I don't think she would've ever dabbled in, in the safety of her own city. I also always thought that as a god Coyote was watching over her, and I loved that it was confirmed in this book. Mercy does seem to cause a mess wherever she goes, but it seems that it's a part of her as Coyote's daughter. And that means endless fun to come. Also I always knew Bran loved her. Mercy seems to doubt it a lot, but I think that is because she is so close to it she can't see the whole picture. My perspective on her being sent away has totally changed. Mercy always frames it as Bran kicked her out and chose Samuel over her. But this book completely changed my view of that

situation. If you think about it the age thing really wouldn't have bothered Bran. He and Samuel are old as dirt, it would make sense for both of them to have partners seriously younger than themselves. Also Bran is old world, getting married as a teenager was the norm for a long time. And Mercy being a Coyote would mean Samuel would be able to easily have shapeshifter children. If Bran really chose Samuel than he would've married Mercy off without a second thought. It's clear in this book that Bran loves Mercy as if she was his blood daughter. He would let the world burn to keep her safe. Bran didn't kick her out, he sent her off. He wanted her to experience life, become her own woman, and as a adult choose the kind of life she wanted for herself. Which she did. Not be stuck forever in the mountains, popping out babies, in that little Werewolf Town. I hope she realizes his real motivations before something bad happens to either of them.

Itâ ÂTMs the sort of thing that happens to Mercyâ Â'sheâ ÂTMs playing a jolly RPG of pirates, and her stepdaughter Jesse (as â ÂœBarbary Belleâ Â• Á¢Â œkillsâ Â• her early on, so she decides to make a huge batch of chocolate chip cookies for the crowd. Adam, meanwhile, knows some-thing bad has happened to her because heâ ÂTMs lost their mating link; he figures out that sheâ ÂTMs in Italy being held by the powerful Lord of the Night near Milan, and organizes a rescue ex-pedition. Meanwhile Mercy gets involved with the Golem of Prague, along with local vam-pires and werewolves, although she manages to get word to the pack that sheâ ÂTMs in Prague.
