

Ginger Josslyn, the coldest Ice Queen, sneering, sarcastic...Ginger, who probably never darkened the doors of a church in her life, who was cruel and cold and strong...Ginger wouldn't stand by and let herself get humiliated or insulted. Ginger wouldn't be the good little girl, like Nikki. Ginger would get back at them. Boom. She looked up, frowning. She had barely heard it--a deep, muffled sound. And other sounds, barely audible--water. Water swishing. There. It was coming from a battered metal door a few feet away. Hmm. Allie walked up to the door. Interesting.

Christian M. Frank is the pen name for a group of writers known as the John Paul 2 High Team. They developed the series and created the characters, and several of them take turns writing the

books. Book Three was written by John Doman. The sixth of ten children, it took John years to find out what he wanted to do with his life. After his graduation from Franciscan University of Steubenville in 2000, he embarked on several different career paths--sports writer, barista, singer-songwriter, pizza guy--before he found his true calling: fixing computers. John lives with his wife Katie near Philadelphia, PA. In his spare time, he posts videos on YouTube of himself playing crazy songs on the guitar for his young son, and writes books for Catholic teens. If you run into him, give him three dollars. Because he's written you another book.

This was amazing. In it, Brian, Liz, and J.P. launch a small group to investigate the person who continually sabotages their school. Allie starts to question her Catholic faith. Even more ethical issues were discussed, and the plot was interesting and intriguing. The cliffhanger was especially intense when Liz comes up with a logical suspect.

This book continues where the last book in the series left off. The students of John Paul II High face new struggles and challenges relating to their school and each other. One classmate wonders about leaving the Catholic faith. Catholic teens will enjoy the novel!

In this book Summer of My Dissent Allie Weaver has an intense struggle with her faith, and has the choice of leaving the Catholic Church or staying. The influence that Allie gets from some of Nikki's old friends, who are protestant, gives her the feeling that they are the ones who are doing the right thing, and when she agrees to attend Cross Bridge, a Christian church, she can't help, but feel right about everything. The music and all the young people together make her feel happy and joyful, she thinks she really understands that Jesus cares for her now. Meanwhile at the Catholic school (all this takes place during the summer, by the way) Liz and Brian are trying to solve a puzzling mystery

over catastrophes that keep happening inside the building. Their attempts seem to draw them closer to the person doing these things, the mystery man. They still are left with this puzzle when the book ends, but it is still worth reading. If you cannot deal with being left hanging over the edge, you should probably wait until more books come out in this series. I probably should have to, but I couldn't help myself. My sister and I had been dying to read the next one after the second book in the series, but it took so long coming out (probably a few months actually) that my older sister was gone when it did. I know that she is happier where she is now though, then if she were just waiting for this book here at home though.
