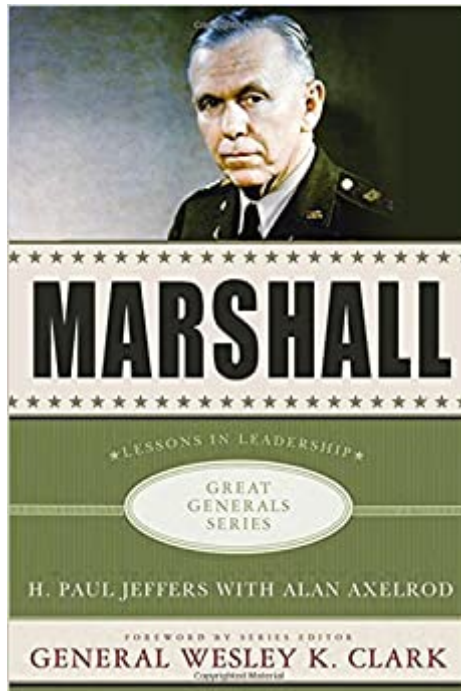

Marshall: Lessons In Leadership (Great Generals)



Synopsis

General George C. Marshall was a skillful and compassionate leader with a unique legacy. He never fired a shot during WWII and led no troops into battle—his brilliance was purely strategic and diplomatic, and incredibly effective. He was responsible for the building, supplying, and, in part, the deployment of over eight million soldiers. In 1947, as Secretary of State, he created the Marshall Plan, a sweeping economic recovery effort that pulled the war-shattered European nations out of ruin, and gave impetus to NATO and the European Common Market. It was for the Marshall Plan that he won the Nobel Peace Prize—the only time in history a military commander has ever been awarded this honor. Marshall's skilled combination of military strategy and politics, emphasis on planning as well as execution, and his expertise in nation-building holds lessons for military and civilian leaders today.

H. Paul Jeffers (1934-2009) was an established military historian and author of seventy books. He worked as an editor and producer at ABC, CBS and NBC, and was the news director at both of New York City's all-news radio stations. Marshall: Lesson in Leadership was his last book. Alan Axelrod is the author of numerous popular history and historically rooted business and management books, including Bradley and Patton in The Great Generals Series, and the BusinessWeek bestsellers Patton on Leadership and Elizabeth I, CEO. He lives in Atlanta, Georgia. General Wesley K. Clark was NATO's Supreme Allied Commander, Europe, and the recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom. He is the author of A Time to Lead, as well as the best selling books Waging Modern War and Winning Modern Wars.

This book gives a quick glance at the events of General Marshall's life: his youth, education at VMI, early army postings, WWI exploits, struggling with lack of promotion between world wars, and his meteoric rise leading into WWII. It offers excellent detail of his handling of personalities, mobilization, and strategy in both wars. Finally it gives a cursory exposition on his work as a statesman in the Truman administration. This book is a good primer on executive management. You'll find that the study of General Marshall is really the closest thing to a Harvard Business School case study in leadership. This little gem has some great lessons. It's a book, though short, packed with a lot of 'heart'. Definitely worth the purchase for the entertaining and educational qualities alone!

Another great book in this series. This biography hits more than just the highpoints of Gen Marshall's life and career but doesn't ever get bogged-down. Not for someone who is doing an in-depth analysis of the man, but a super read to learn who the man was and understand many of the great deeds he did while serving his country in multiple capacities. I learned a lot and recommend the book for anyone with an interest in WW I, WW II and post WW II US and European

history, or just about a great American.

Marshall is an astonishing personality of the 20th century, he was almost a genius in logistics and organization. He very seldom commanded troops in battles, however he was responsible for supplies and logistics of the allies in all their great theaters of WWII. I think the other important thing to bear in mind is that he was not a "prima donna" like Patton or MacArthur, on the contrary. He had a completely different personality from the formers.
