

Faithful Presence: Seven Disciplines That Shape The Church For Mission





Synopsis

In our quest to renew the church, Christians have walked through seeker-friendly, emergent, missional, and other movements to develop new expressions of the body of Christ. Now in the post-Christian world in North America we're asking the question again: Is there a way to be the church that engages the world, not by judgment nor accommodation but by becoming the good news in our culture? In Faithful Presence, noted pastor and scholar David Fitch offers a new vision for the witness of the church in the world. He argues that we have lost the intent and practice of the sacramental ways of the historic church, and he recovers seven disciplines that have been with us since the birth of the church. Through numerous examples and stories, he demonstrates how these revolutionary disciplines can help the church take shape in and among our neighborhoods, transform our way of life in the world, and advance the kingdom. This book will help you re-envision church, what you do in the name of church, and the way you lead a church. It recovers a future for the church that takes us beyond Christendom. Embrace the call to reimagine the church as the living embodiment of Christ, dwelling in and reflecting God's faithful presence to a world that desperately needs more of it.

This book is a remarkable description of the ways Christ is especially present with his people. It is thoroughly biblical and well researched. He really remade my thinking on the Lord's Supper. It's not a take your pick along the spectrum from mystical Catholic sacrament to flimsy Protestant ordinance. The heart is that Christ is with us and this extends into the community. The author's view on "white privileged" is very odd. If the poor and sick, who we identify with and seek out, are characterized by a lack of privilege, then the privileged are simply the opposite. To say a race is privileged in itself is at best a specious historical argument and at worst the very definition of white supremacy. Minor quibble though--buy and read this book, 5 stars.

This book has been an incredible help to me. I was encouraged and challenged in reading it. There is a great mix of stories added that give tangible examples to see the practical working out of what David contends. I also found this book helpful to connect and come to greater understanding on what he writes on his facebook page and says on the podcast, Theology on Mission. I highly recommend this book and very grateful for it. After finishing it I am moved to action and deeper thought on many levels.

This book is fantastic and will greatly shape the way our church community lives as disciples on mission together. The creative work of David Fitch's three circles of encountering God's Presence in our world brings strong continuity to all aspects of a disciple's life, tying together our more intimate moments of communion with God to the times we are interacting in a world that does not know Jesus. These disciplines will greatly help us live a missional life over the long haul and with

faithfulness to Jesus and His Kingdom.

This book was a breath of fresh air. Fitch's models of the close circle, dotted circle, and half circle have helped me articulate to the folks around me why our "program-driven",

"build-it-and-they-will-come" ministries aren't producing fruit like they did twenty, thirty, forty years ago. And really, this book challenges the "build-it-and-they-will-come" attitude. I love it. Living our day-to-day lives with intentionality, discerning together the Holy Spirit at work around us, and submitting to Christ's rule and reign as we go about our everyday lives--these are the things that will transform the world around us.I can highly recommend this book!

I began this book with a desire to make the Eucharist or Lord's Table central to all I do.But this is only one discipline that the author encourages. I was surprised that the Cosmic Weaver was already knitting the threads of Kingdom Prayer and the Fivefold Gifting into my life and ministry. I recommend this book to those who want to capture the essence of what it means to be Christ's body on earth. And the author addresses the generation gap that exists currently in the body of Christ. One which I myself see.

I've watched David Fitch for several years as he works out his sharp theological mind & heart of a missionary as a church planter and pastor. I'm drawn to what I see. Most books on church are written by pastors (mega church only). A few are penned by theologians. Faithful Presence is unique in that the author is both at the same time, and continues to be. It is obvious his knowledge of both biblical theology and church history are broad. From that soil, the author points out several life-giving practices we can grow into. Each one is sound, yet some are decidedly counter-cultural in 21st-century North America. While some of Fitch's language is new to me, I can't argue with how organic and genuinely Spirit-led this sounds. What it is definitely not is another book filled with quick ways to get bunch of people to follow an autocratic pastor. Rather, it shows the heart of a caring pastor, the mind of a dedicated theologian, and the hands-on willingness of a missionary to North America today. I look forward to seeing the stories that come from more of us fleshing out these practices in our local contexts.

I've been a United Methodist most of my life. And for about 30 years I was a Pastor in it. The United Methodist Church has been in steep decline for many years and many plans and programs have been tried over the years to stem the decline. All have failed. We do not need another top down

program. We need a way of life, of living together as described by David Fitch in this book. I would urge all my United Methodist friends to by this book and form several groups to read and discuss it.
