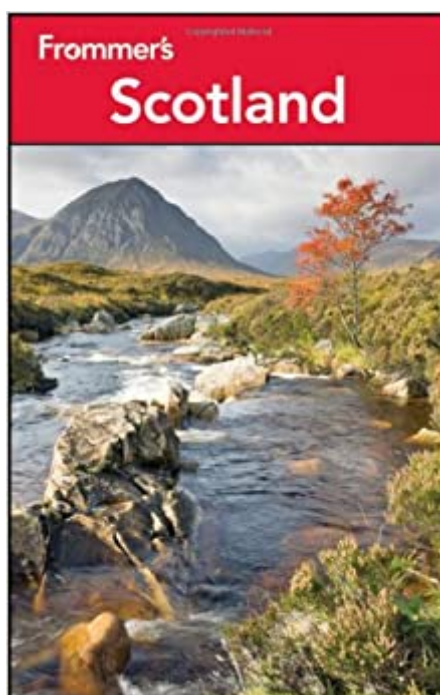

This version of the Frommer's Guide will be useful to have on your Kindle, so that you don't have to carry around a heavy book, but it could have been done so much better. The main weakness is the Table of Contents. The book has Chapters, major headings, and sub-headings, and maybe even more divisions that I haven't been able to distinguish. That's because in the table of contents, everything is in the same typeface, same font, and all aligned with the left margin. It's impossible to understand if what you're clicking on is a major heading or just a little tidbit. Some of the headings are not even in the table of contents, especially those that come immediately after a higher-level heading. There are not even spaces between the chapters, so just to find the beginning of a chapter requires careful reading of the contents. There are no illustrations in the Kindle version, and the maps are not very useful. However, they provide a website where you can download

higher-definition versions of the maps. I'm not sorry I bought the book, but I hope for more. The Kindle version costs about 60% of the price of the print version, but I think a larger discount should be offered, given the disadvantages.

Too many photos would have been cumbersome but this book has NONE! Not one photograph save for the cover. For a first timer to a new contry would have been nice to see something of the landscape in my guide book. technically I was VERY disppointed that in some of the maps (which look to have been photocopied and tinted pink) the route numbers are in such light grey text that it made them useless. I even had a magnifying glass trying to see the route numbers but couldnt make them out on the first few maps in the book. Other than that, the locations of golf courses and eatery descriptions were abundant.

It's amazing how excellent Frommer's is!! You could say that there are travel guides and there's Frommers. I always read Frommer's to wherever I'm travelling and it's always extremelly complete in information. Frommer's Scotland is no different. What I also think is useful is that they give you prices to the attractions, hotels, restaurants, etc. It's a must read!!

Good, clear description. Wide coverage. Enjoyable reading. Read beyond this for serious travel, but do not just go to hotels and restaurants in this book; read the history and culture sections, which are excellent and often overlooked.

Having been to Scotland twice before I can say with certainty that this guide contains quite a bit of outdated material. Additionally, it has inexplicable gaps in its recommendations of things to do and see. I'm not sure how Frommer's compiles these guides and maybe others are excellent, but this one on Scotland is definitely wanting.

Frommer's is always a good choice for information. Just wish it was updated annually.

I have another Frommers book for Ireland, and loved it. Very informative and colorful. However, this book for Scotland has NO pictures, I wish I had noticed that before I ordered it. Otherwise, it is very informative and has a lot of useful tips for visiting Scotland.
