


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Benchmark Oregon: Road & Recreation Atlas - Third Edition (Benchmark Map: Oregon Road & Recreation Atlas)

The first eight maps in the book break Oregon into large areas, shown for their recreational values that include various types of publicly owned land. In addition to the enormously detailed and beautiful Landscape Maps, there is a Hunting and

Fishing section and expanded Recreation Resources. The Recreation Guide has updated web sites and phone numbers and the accompanying recreation maps have statewide Wildlife Management Units by name and boundary. These units are shown over public land ownership color tints...handy for accessing hunting areas and applying for tags and permits.

Benchmark are absolutely the best road atlases out there. I have the AZ, UT, OR, and CA maps that I have purchased for trips (I use my CA one all the time, but I live here) and find them invaluable. I can always find my way when lost, and they really do a great job of showing detail that you wouldn't expect, even in metro areas. They show the most random and remote Forest Service or BLM roads, and points of interest on those roads that you would otherwise need specialty maps to see. If there's a dirt road or otherwise going there, these maps show it. Highly recommended!

I purchased both the Oregon Benchmark edition and the Oregon Atlas and Gazatteer edition on .com. The Benchmark one has considerably less detail than the second one I ordered. Often roads in the Benchmark edition are not named, and having traveled in the central part of Oregon, that can present problems. Personally I prefer the detail that the Oregon Atlas/Gazatteer (by Delorme) has to offer. This is not to say the Benchmark edition isn't helpful -- but having both to look through, I find the Delorme Atlas better suits my needs for more complete detail.

I have purchased both the Washington and Oregon Benchmark Road & Recreation Atlas. These are indispensable if you are going to new places that are off an Interstate Highway. The level of detail is perfect for any outdoors person. Shown are virtually every public campground, forest road, river, stream, and boat launch, and even towns with populations of 50 and less. The editors thought the atlas through so that ANYONE can use it immediately upon receipt. I will never go back to folding maps. An excellent resource for any level of traveling!

The Benchmark map for Oregon beats the DeLorme series hands down. It is especially useful for the recreational user needing detailed information on road quality of minor backwoods roads. Contour/elevation/terrain information approaches the accuracy of USGS topographic maps. The information on recreational sites (campgrounds, etc.) is good but one should still check with the local USFS/BLM station on whether the facility is open and what the current regulation are in effect for it.

Like all of their State map products! A good choice to track where places are in the state.
